
Compliance **Update**



From the Senior Manager, Joan Campbell, CPM

Dear Residents,





An emergency is defined as anything that could harm a resident or damage property. Maintenance will respond anytime day or night to eliminate the danger and take care the matter at hand. We may have to finish completing the permanent repair during normal working hours.

The following is a summary of issues that are considered emergencies. If you have any questions, please call the front desk.

- If the bathroom sink or toilet is leaking onto floor
- If the only toilet in your apartment is stopped up and will not flush (Do not continue to flush if the water is not going down.)
- If water is leaking into your apartment through the ceiling or walls. Call for front desk for emergency service.
 - If the electrical outlets or permanently installed lights stop working
- If the refrigerator stops cooling or the light won't come on
- If you smell gas and the knobs are turned off on your stove
- If the smoke detector/CO detector sounds the alarm and you are not cooking. If you are cooking and the alarm sounds, open your windows and turn on the exhaust fan. If the alarm will not silence after 5 minutes of airing out the apartment, please call.
- If the temperature drops 5 degrees below the set point of your thermostat and you have been in that room for at least 20 minutes
- If your entrance door lock is malfunctioning and you can not enter or leave your apartment
- If you are locked out due to losing your key, you will be charged a fee of \$25 for staff to come unlock your door after hours. Please make sure you always have your key with you at all times.

Feel free to report nonemergency issues any time and they will be scheduled for repair during normal business hours.

PARKING OUT FRONT OF THE BUILDING

For our resident's convenience, you are able to park temporarily in front of the building for up to 30 minutes after the front desk gives you the pass to put in your car. We have several residents that are leaving their car out front for long extended periods of time, which is not fair to other residents. Any residents that continues to do this will be notified and the front desk has been instructed to call the police to have the car ticketed.

Please remember that no one is permitted to use their stove to add heat to their apartment. The thermostat is designed to maintain 78 to 80 degrees in your apartment. If we learn of a stove being used for heat, the resident will receive a letter from management making it clear that this is a lease

violation leading to termination of lease.

Laundry Room

When using the laundry Room facility, keep in mind that you should not leave your clothes unattended. We are not

By now, you should have received a statement of 2018 income from Social Security. This statement is called a 1099. Also, you should have received a Benefit Statement of your (2019) income showing an increase. Please make sure you hold on to these statements for future needs as proof of income.

2019 Renter's Tax Credit Refund

Applications for the Renter's Tax Credit Refund are now available. If you have applied before, you should start receiving an application within a week automatically in the mail unless you have move. If you have moved to a different unit, see me. If you are eligible, you have until September1, 2019 to file. Eligible participants will need the following documents to file for a refund.

- 1. 2018 Award letter, 1099, W2, or **Income Statements**
- 2. 2018 Lease Agreement
- 3. Social Security Card
- 4. Picture ID
